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INNER STRUGGLES

ABANDONED?

In the Psalms we read:

Those who know your name trust in you, for you, O LORD, do not abandon those who search for you.

Psalm 9:10 (NLT)

Even if my father and mother abandon me, the LORD will hold me close.

Psalm 27:10 (NLT)

To be abandoned by a partner or long-term friend, or even your parents, is truly devastating. We often take it for granted that those whom we have trusted over many years will always stick by us.

Jesus knows what it means to be abandoned. He was abandoned by His closest disciples, hours before His arrest and trial. The Bible tells us that Jesus' soul was overwhelmed with sorrow. Twice He discovered His disciples asleep, after He had asked them to keep watch while He spent time alone to pray.

The following day, one of those disciples, Peter, repeatedly denied that he knew Jesus, just as Jesus said he would. At the time when Jesus most needed their support, the disciples abandoned Him.

Unlike His disciples and unlike anyone else, Jesus will always remain faithful to everyone who seeks Him and chooses to follow Him. He will never abandon them. No one could want a better friend, not only for this life but for ever.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I feel as though I have been abandoned and I need someone who, I know for certain, will always be there for me. Please help me to understand how I can know Jesus.

ANGRY?

The Apostle Paul wrote:

'In your anger do not sin': do not let the sun go down while you are still angry...

Ephesians 4:26

Anger is a very powerful emotion. At times it is right to be angry: for example, at the widespread injustice in the world, especially the abuse of the poor and vulnerable by those who hold power.

Usually, however, our anger is self-centred: either we are expressing our own feelings of frustration and failure or we are venting our feelings to someone who has hurt us.

The Apostle Paul gives us two instructions. Firstly, he warns us against failing to control our anger: it can so easily cause us to act unwisely, perhaps by taking revenge against a person.

Secondly, Paul tells us not to hold on to anger, for it can quickly lead to deep-seated resentment and bitterness, which can linger, so painfully, for weeks, months and even years.

If there is someone with whom you are angry, why not ask God to help you to forgive the person? Why not decide now to release that person – and yourself – from your anger?

DEAR FATHER GOD

I realise that my anger has become such a part of my life and I do not want it any longer. Please help me to put this incident behind me – forever. Please help me to forgive (the person's name).

ANXIOUS?

The Apostle Paul wrote:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Philippians 4:6-7

Nothing can bring greater joy than knowing Jesus. For this reason, Paul had just told the Christians in Philippi that they should always rejoice.

But Paul realises that there is one thing, above all else, which can rob people of their joy – anxiety. It can be so destructive. When we are anxious we feel as though we are carrying a great burden. We do not want to put it down or allow anyone to take it from us: we hold on to it tightly.

Paul's instruction is very clear: in every situation – whatever the circumstances – we should ask God to help us with the burden we are carrying.

There is no promise that the cause of the anxiety will be immediately resolved. However, we can expect God to protect our hearts and minds with His peace.

When anxiety comes, what do you do? Do you keep it to yourself, perhaps until it becomes just unbearable? Paul's advice is the much better option.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I do get anxious over all sorts of issues. Even now, I am anxious about (*explain the anxiety*). Please show me how to deal with this and please guard my heart and mind with Your peace.

ASHAMED?

The Apostle Paul wrote:

... if you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.

As Scripture says, 'Anyone who believes in him will never be put to shame.'

Romans 10:9,11

Jesus encountered two women who felt ashamed. One was a Samaritan whom He met as she was drawing water at a well. Jesus knew that she had had five husbands and was now living with another man.¹

Jesus met the other woman when she intruded on a dinner party at which He was a guest. She was well known as a woman of 'ill-repute'. As she anointed Jesus' feet with an expensive perfume, she wept: no doubt, her tears were tears of shame.²

Jesus did not condemn either woman. He spoke to them with gentleness and kindness. And they responded to Him, knowing that they had been forgiven and could put their shame behind them

If you are struggling with shame, whether you have managed to hide it from others or whether it is 'in the open', why not bring it to Jesus? He already knows about it and is ready to receive you and forgive you.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I have done things of which I am ashamed, especially (name the things which are causing the shame). I realise that they have never been hidden from You. Please forgive me and please release me from my shame.

CONDEMNED?

The Apostle Paul wrote:

Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus...

Romans 8:1

King David wrote:

The LORD will rescue his servants; no one who takes refuge in him will be condemned.

Psalm 34:22

The world is eager to condemn but God is eager to forgive. And it is God's forgiveness that really counts, for that secures our future with Him – for eternity.

We all deserve God's condemnation because we have all failed to meet His standards. But God is full of mercy and does not want to condemn us. He sent His Son, Jesus, to take the punishment which we deserve. Jesus did that when He was condemned to death in our place.

But to avoid God's condemnation, we have to choose to receive His forgiveness; we have to be 'in Christ', believing that Jesus died in our place and deciding to follow Him.

Try not to worry about other people judging you and condemning you. What is crucial is being sure that God will not condemn you. If you have never asked God to forgive you, will you do so now? What is involved is fully explained on pages 113-121.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I understand the choice I have to make. I turn to Jesus Christ now. I know that He has taken my punishment so that You will forgive me and not condemn me. Thank You.

CRUSHED?

King David wrote:

The righteous cry out, and the LORD hears them; he delivers them from all their troubles.

The LORD is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit.

Psalm 34:17-18

David wrote many Psalms in order to pour out his deepest feelings to God. There were times when he was compelled to pour out his thanks and praise to Him for all His goodness.

At other times he was in a really difficult situation and could see no way out: he felt crushed by his circumstances. Yet even in those very dark times, he knew that God had not deserted him.

Jesus Himself chose to engage with those who most needed Him: those whom society looked to crush. It was not that others did not need Jesus: they were just too blind to see their need. The religious leaders were especially critical of Jesus. They taunted Him as being a 'friend of sinners'.1

No one, whatever their status in society, could ask for a better friend than Jesus, the Son of God. If you feel crushed or broken, turn to God. Allow Him to come alongside you and restore you.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I do feel crushed and I cannot see any way out of my situation. I have tried just about everything. I do not know what else I can do. God, please help me, please restore me.

Robin Oake's Story

When someone hurts us or a loved one, anger is a natural response – or even hatred if it is a serious offence. If a member of our family was murdered, hatred would be the obvious and expected response and certainly not forgiveness.

But Robin Oake QPM, a former Chief Constable of the Isle of Man Constabulary, was able to do that – to forgive. He forgave the killer of his son, Stephen, murdered whilst on Special Branch duty in Manchester in 2003.

Neither of my parents were Christians but they sent my two sisters and me to Sunday School, just as many children were at that time. It was at a Crusaders camp in Dorset that I believed the gospel was true and decided to follow Jesus Christ.

I joined the Met Police a day before my 19th birthday and spent 15 years in London, including a spell on the staff at the International Police College, having specialised in counter-terrorism. I then moved to Manchester, where I became Assistant Chief Constable. Later I was appointed Chief Constable for Isle of Man.

Obviously I will never forget the evening, at about 9.00pm, that I received a call from the Deputy Chief Constable in Manchester to give me the devastating news that Stephen had been murdered. During a raid on a property, he discovered a known terrorist suspect. He went to drag him from under the table where he was hiding and was stabbed in the heart.

My wife, Chris, was in Altrincham looking after grandchildren. Immediately I phoned her and Stephen's wife, Lesley, desperate that they should hear the news from me before it was broadcast on the TV.

The following morning I had to address a press conference; the media had chartered a plane to the Island. I felt I handled the conference as best I could but I hadn't anticipated one of the questions: 'What

do you think of the man who killed your son?' I paused to pray (silently, of course!) before responding: 'I don't know the man or his circumstances but I forgive him. And I pray that God will forgive him.' There was a sense of disbelief at my response.

My response also reflected the motto I had embraced and promoted throughout my career, 'All Lives Matter'. I had picked it up during my training when it was emphasised that there were no exceptions – the lives of criminals matter too.

Later I wondered whether I was right to have said that without first speaking to Chris and, especially, to Lesley. Lesley did agree that I was right but didn't think that she would have been able to say it herself.

Why did I choose to forgive? Well, I believe that God gave me those words, which reflect the Bible's teaching. But also, I knew that my life would be very negative if I was not a forgiving person. And I knew, too, that I was constantly in need of forgiveness myself.

The funeral was held at Manchester Cathedral and the streets were lined with people who wanted to honour Stephen. As I welcomed the guests I said: 'It is not goodbye, Steve. Au revoir, I will see you later.' As he had professed faith in Christ, I knew beyond any doubt that Stephen was safe in heaven with the Lord Jesus: I know I will 'see him later'.

I hope that the man who killed Stephen will also be there. I pray for him every day, asking God to reveal Himself to him, so that he will receive God's forgiveness through faith in Christ.

DESPAIRING?

The Apostle Paul wrote:

We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair;

2 Corinthians 4:8

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Romans 15:13

When we are on the brink of despairing, it is natural to want to cling on to the hope that there might be 'light at the end of the tunnel'. But if we cannot see the end of the tunnel, our hope can so easily begin to slip away.

As we lose hope, despair will often take its place. We may begin to imagine the worst possible outcomes to the situation we are facing. That can be exceptionally draining – and painful.

The Apostle Paul suffered both physically and mentally. At various times he was whipped, stoned and imprisoned; he experienced rejection, injustice and abuse. And yet his trust in 'the God of hope' meant that he never reached the point of despairing.

For Paul, hope did not simply mean wishful thinking; rather, it was an absolute confidence that God would not fail him. Today, Christians have that same hope, a hope which will never give way to despair.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I know that I am losing hope. I cannot face the prospect of being in utter despair. Please help me to put my trust in You, so that my hope is restored and I find peace with You.

DISCOURAGED?

God's words to Joshua:

"...Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go."

Joshua 1:9

Discouragement has been spoken of as a disease. If we think of it in that way, then it must be the most common of all diseases. We have all suffered from it and we will always be at risk of being 'infected' again: a discouraged person can quickly discourage others.

We can become discouraged when we fail to achieve our objectives or meet unexpected obstacles. We can also become discouraged by our fear of failure or by criticism from others.

After Moses had died, God knew the enormous responsibility which Joshua would be taking on as leader of the Israelites. He encouraged Joshua with the promise that He would always be

with him. With that promise, Joshua could be strong and courageous and not be afraid or get discouraged.

If you are facing discouragement, why not ask God to help you to be strong and courageous? If you are trusting in Him, then that promise to Joshua is for you also.

DEAR FATHER GOD

You know how discouraged I am because of the difficulties I am facing and the criticism I am getting. Thank You for always being with me. Please take away my fear and help me to be strong, giving me the courage I need to move forward.

DISTRESSED?

Words of Jesus:

He took Peter, James and John along with him, and he began to be deeply distressed and troubled. 'My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death,' he said to them. 'Stay here and keep watch.'

Mark 14:33-34

We must never think that, because Jesus was God, He was immune from suffering and trouble when He lived on earth. He was both God and Man and He experienced all the emotions that we experience.

So it was right that He was deeply distressed shortly before He was to be arrested. He cried out to his Father, 'Please take this cup of suffering away from me. Yet I want your will to be done, not mine.' Jesus knew the horrendous suffering which the crucifixion would bring but He was willing to obey God's wishes.

Jesus provides that supreme example for us to follow when we are distressed. Often, the only thing we can do is pray. It is always the best thing.

Are you in deep distress over something? If you have not yet prayed, do so now. Your prayer will be heard by Jesus Himself, now at God's right hand. He knows exactly how you are feeling.

DEAR FATHER GOD

It is comforting to know that You understand exactly how distressed I am. Everything is possible for You. Please (*make your personal request*). Please help me to accept whatever is Your will and give me the strength I need.

Adam's Story

None of the experiences during my twenty years in the Police force – fourteen as a sergeant – prepared me for the trials that followed the diagnosis of ulcerative colitis. On my 49th birthday I had my large intestine removed. I left hospital after two weeks, having gained a 'bag for life' – a colostomy bag – and having lost more than three stone in weight.

I was in a dark place, distressed and discouraged, not least because God had not answered the prayers of so many people for my healing. I began to take my eyes off God. And yet, He would not allow me to forget all His blessings over many years.

I recognised that God is good. He gave me the desire to return to that daily pattern of reading and

studying His Word, of praying and of worshipping. I also received encouragement from others as I shared with them the continuing pain of how I felt.

Eventually God spoke to me. He reminded me of the distress that Jesus Himself had endured in the Garden of Gethsemane. He was about to be arrested and would have to face the horrific experience of crucifixion, which He would suffer on my account. I recalled the words of Jesus, '... Yet not as I will, but as you will'. I knew that had to be my response also; I knew that I had to submit to God's will.

God had not failed me. As well as praying for healing, I had also prayed that God would teach me and He did. I had had a major operation but really I felt that I had had a second one – spiritual surgery. My faith has been tested and refined and I now feel stronger than ever. We must all keep our eyes on Jesus.

Felicity's Story

As a child I attended Sunday School and I looked up to my paternal grandfather, a Methodist Minister. But whilst I believed in Jesus, I did not have a living faith and my church attendance was erratic.

When I joined the Police in 2001, my faith gradually began to grow. But like it is for many people, my faith was all about what I expected from God, rather than what He had already done for me through His Son. What I wanted most was to be kept safe; I knew I would encounter dangerous situations.

It was about nine years later that I really started to become strong in my faith. I recall an occasion when I was involved in taking a dishevelled drunk into custody. I found it highly offensive that he used a page from the Bible to roll a cigarette, something which was quite common in prison, so I understand.

I heard of a man who was given a Bible on the strict understanding that he read each page he removed before using it to roll his cigarette. He agreed and read the whole of the first three gospels. But then he recognised that it was disrespectful to abuse the Bible. More importantly, he changed his ways. Such is the power of God's Word to change lives.

I endured some turbulent times during my career. Bullying led to a mental breakdown and two years later I was close to having a second one. The Lord drew me closer to Him. He, along with the support of church friends, enabled me to persevere through those difficult times. My faith grew until it was fully reignited at a Christian conference.

My church is now such a crucial part of my life. I also serve as a Street Pastor and am the deputy lead for the local branch of the CPA.

Sarah's Story

Having given my life to Jesus while at secondary school, and then graduated from university with a degree in psychology, I asked God to reveal His plan for me. That was in 1994 and it required a huge leap of faith to join the Police. It was not the obvious choice of career for someone who hated confrontation and would never watch violent films. But I sensed that it was where God wanted me to serve Him.

A friend at church, a police sergeant, questioned the wisdom of my thinking. He pointed out that three things would be an issue for me as a police recruit; I was black, female and loved Jesus! That didn't deter me. I knew that I did have one thing going for me – rather a person, God Himself. Not only is He with us in every situation but He is able to bring the right people around us when we most need them.

I was in uniform for five years. I loved it. It was not easy, of course, but I held on to that confidence that God would be with me at all times. It was reflected in the little plaque by the side of my bed: 'Lord, help me to remember that there is nothing that happens today that you and I can't handle.' Naturally I made it known that I was a Christian and, perhaps surprisingly, my colleagues had a quiet respect for my beliefs.

Even though I enjoyed the work and I was conscious of God being with me, I lacked confidence in my own ability and I struggled with that. I simply felt that I wasn't sufficiently streetwise. Others could spot a thief at five paces; my natural tendency was to trust people.

That nagging doubt in my ability caused me to write a letter of resignation on several occasions but, each time, someone (prompted by God, I am sure) persuaded me that I had a lot to offer and should persevere. Sometimes people see things in you that you can't see yourself. Every letter got torn up.

As I approached my sixth year, I joined the CID as a PC and it was while I was there that I was approached to assist with a murder investigation – the most high profile investigation at that time. Suddenly, being black of African origin, female and a Christian had real advantages.

I have since worked on many similar investigations, with my knowledge of other languages often being an asset. I have been deployed as a Family Liaison Officer, a role which I have really loved.

I have now served as an officer for more than 25 years, the last six as a Family Liaison Advisor. I didn't expect to manage more than ten years!

As I look back on my career, I can see that God's timing has always been perfect and I am thankful to Him that all those letters of resignation got binned! My faith has remained my foundation throughout. I love my job but not as much as I love God. It was very fitting that both were mentioned in the citation when I was awarded a QPM recently.

I have served and continue to serve many people and communities but these verses remind me that, most importantly, I am serving Jesus Christ.

Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving.¹

It is the promise of His reward that I treasure more than anything else.

EMPTY?

The Apostle Peter wrote:

For you know that God paid a ransom to save you from the empty life you inherited from your ancestors.

And it was not paid with mere gold or silver, which lose their value. It was the precious blood of Christ, the sinless, spotless Lamb of God.

1 Peter 1:18-19 (NLT)

Even people with busy lives may complain that their life is empty. Despite being so busy – and perhaps too busy – they recognise that something is missing: they are not being fulfilled.

Although wealthy and powerful, King Solomon, the son of King David, experienced that sense of emptiness. He was renowned for his great wisdom and he concluded that life is 'meaningless, a chasing after the wind.'

About 1,000 years later the Apostle Peter reminded the Christians that Jesus had saved them from their empty way of life. And Jesus Himself said that He had come in order that people might have life to the full.²

If you feel your life is empty of meaning, do not try to fill it with pleasures or possessions. They will fail to satisfy you. Instead, look to Jesus. Only He can meet your deepest needs. Only He can bring real meaning to your life – a life that is full and satisfying.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I know my life is empty of meaning and purpose. If Jesus came to earth to give people life that is truly satisfying, then I need to understand what it means to have Jesus in my life. Please help me.

ENSLAVED?

Words of Jesus:

Jesus replied, 'Very truly I tell you, everyone who sins is a slave to sin. Now a slave has no permanent place in the family, but a son belongs to it for ever. So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed...'

John 8:34-36

Almost 30 million people are thought to be living as slaves across the world today. That is a truly astonishing figure. But should we be so horrified that men and women will control and use and abuse fellow human beings?

The slave 'owners' are themselves slaves, for the Bible tells us that we are all slaves to sin (that is, we rebel against God), unless Jesus has set us free.

When Jesus does set us free, we are 'born again' with a new nature. And with our new nature comes a new desire: a desire to live to please God as we take our place in His family. We will not be perfect and will continue to sin. But we will no longer be controlled by that old sinful nature which enslaves us.

Have you yet been released from your life of slavery? If not, are you ready to begin a new life of true freedom, as a child of God? How you can do that – and what it means to be 'born again' – is explained on pages 113-121.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I know that I am a slave to sin. I do not seem to be in control of my own life. I feel as though someone else is controlling me. I do things I really do not want to do. Jesus, please set me free.

GRIEVING?

Words of King David:

The LORD is my shepherd, I lack nothing.
He makes me lie down in green pastures,
he leads me beside quiet waters...

Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.

Psalm 23:1-2,4

We can all expect to experience grief through death at some point in our lives. Some will also face it through divorce or separation.

As we grieve, we need someone to journey with us: someone willing to spend time with us but only when we need them; someone willing to talk with us but only when we wish to talk; someone willing to listen when we do not want advice;

someone willing to cry with us; someone willing to accept our outbursts of anger.

There is no better person to journey with us, through the darkest valleys, than Jesus. He always knows our deepest thoughts and our deepest needs. He will never leave those who choose to journey with Him, either through the valleys or over the hills.

It is good to have family members and close friends who will walk with you as you grieve but accept Jesus as that very best friend. You can depend upon Him totally.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am thankful for the friends who are trying to help me but they do not really understand how I am feeling. And they do not know what to say. But You must understand completely. Please comfort me and help me through my grief.

GUILT-RIDDEN?

Words of the Apostle:

How much more, then, will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from acts that lead to death, so that we may serve the living God!

Hebrews 9:14

Let us draw near to God with a sincere heart and with the full assurance that faith brings, having our hearts sprinkled to cleanse us from a guilty conscience ...

Hebrews 10:22

In a shop recently, I was overwhelmed by the range of cleaning products, with special products for each type of surface and each type of stain. I was delighted when I spotted a multipurpose cleaner!

Stains spoil the appearance of the fabric (or carpet or surface) and it is very satisfying when you find the right product to remove them.

The worst stains are not to be found in our home but within us. They are the stains of our guilt. They are the result of the things which we have done and now regret. The very worst stains can be very difficult to live with.

There is just one remedy for our stains: the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus had never sinned Himself and was the perfect sacrifice, offered to God in our place. To receive God's forgiveness – and have our guilty conscience cleansed – we must turn to Jesus Christ.

DEAR FATHER GOD

The guilt I am carrying around with me is just too much. I must get rid of it. I keep asking myself why I did those things. Will You please help me? I do believe that only Jesus can truly cleanse me.

Peter's Story

God who knit me together in my mother's womb (as we are reminded in Psalm 139) saved me in her womb. Her GP refused her request to abort me.

With a mother with psychological problems and an alcoholic father, I couldn't expect a happy childhood. In an attempt to save the marriage, the family (now with my two sisters and a brother) emigrated to Australia. When we returned the following year, my mother and my sisters moved in with my grandparents. I was left to look after my young brother and cope with my father. A few weeks later my brother and I were dropped off with a suitcase at my grandparents' home. My mother was reluctant to let us in but my grandmother intervened.

Even while at primary school I could not wait to leave home. My first job was in a bingo club and I was a manager by the age of 21. Money and women

were all that mattered to me, alongside an aspiration to outperform my father. Having stopped drinking, he had built up a business, including two nightclubs and a snooker hall. He owned a massive house, a Rolls Royce and an apartment in Spain.

I began to question my motives; I knew there had to be more to life than what I was looking for. I started going to church with a girl I had met. A year later God saved me for a second time. He gave me a completely new life as His child.

As a Christian, I realised that the business I was in was not ideal. God prompted me to apply for the Police, which seemed crazy for someone with a history of lawbreaking from the age of ten, including a spell on probation. But I filled in the application form honestly, went through the process and was accepted. Satan fought to keep me where I was – but lost! Despite the offer to manage

a new licensed bingo club, I pursued what I believed was God's calling – the Police Service.

The first year was tough. I refused to compromise on my faith, encountered animosity and came close to resigning. But that changed when I returned from the Police College with the Baton of Honour. I was good at my job and and my bosses recognised it.

I married the girl with whom I started attending church and we had two kids very quickly. Then things started to go wrong. I was diagnosed with clinical depression. Things were not going well at work, I was unfaithful to my wife and from being teetotal I began drinking to excess. My wife divorced me. I hoped that drinking more heavily would deaden the pain of my failure and the guilt it brought.

It was a miracle that I managed to function at work but I knew I had to stop drinking or I would die. I went to a healing service and God delivered me from alcoholism. I walked out of that meeting 13 years ago and have not touched alcohol since. Sadly I have lost a brother and my father to alcohol. Slowly I returned to my faith and learned to talk about my past.

Although I was being healed slowly, I still had to deal daily with depression and guilt about my past. I returned to the CPA and out of the blue was invited to be a Regional Coordinator. I did not think I was worthy of the role, and probably still don't, but I have loved it and it has brought me many friends. Most importantly, I have regained that meaning and purpose which only comes from a deep relationship with Jesus. I know God's love and I am so grateful that He has forgiven all my failings, as I know He has.

Hannah's Story

I accepted Jesus as my Lord and Saviour in 1989 whilst serving in the WRAF in Germany. Although I struggled to be faithful as a Christian in the WRAF, God remained faithful and guided and protected me.

In 1991, I was posted to Rheindahlen and met my future husband in church on the very first Sunday. I had experienced an earlier, abusive marriage, which had a knock-on effect (pardon the pun) when I came to faith, particularly with forgiveness. I was 'adopted', along with many 'singles', by a couple whom God used to heal and restore me. Then in September 1992 I remarried.

After we moved to the UK in 2005 my husband began getting headaches and a scan revealed a lesion. I was devastated. Naturally I prayed that God would heal him but, also, that His will should be done. It was the hardest prayer I ever prayed but I knew that God's purposes are always best.

On the day of his surgery, I prayed and cried (mostly cried!) in the hospital chapel. I didn't feel any 'presence' but never doubted that God was holding me up.

It was found that he had a grade four tumour. Radiotherapy treatment followed. Still on steroids, he developed the side effect of 'steroid psychosis', turning my kind and gentle husband into an aggressive, angry and delusional man. It was as though a stranger had taken over his body. The tumour grew and the day came when the surgeon announced that it was too big for him to operate. He died in October 2008, aged 46.

God didn't 'make' my husband ill, as one friend suggested. We live in a fallen world and disease and decay are part of this realm, which is why we all die. Of course, it was an enormously traumatic time but God never let go of me. My best prayers were 'Lord Thou knowest' and 'Lord, Thy will be done'.

We may not understand God's ways and thoughts but He is always faithful, true and righteous.

HUNGRY?

Words of Jesus:

Then Jesus declared, 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

For my Father's will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day.'

John 6:35,40

Jesus spoke these words to the crowds, shortly after He fed more than five thousand hungry people with just five small loaves and two small fish.

The crowds hoped for more – and greater – material things from Jesus' miraculous powers but He had to disappoint them. His mission was not to satisfy their appetites for material pleasures and possessions but to meet their deep spiritual needs.

Jesus referred to Himself as the bread of life. He had come to earth to give life – eternal life. It was available to everyone who was hungry to know Jesus and to believe in Him. Today, Jesus still longs that people will have a hunger for Him.

Will you follow the crowds with their hunger for popularity, power, status, success, wealth and so much more: a hunger that will never truly be met?

Or will you choose to accept Jesus' invitation to follow Him? If you choose Jesus, your hunger will be satisfied and you will be safe with Him for eternity.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I know this to be true. I see this with my friends who have achieved and gained so much and yet are hungry for more. I do believe what Jesus has said. I know I will only find real satisfaction in following Him. I intend to do that.

INSECURE?

The words of the Apostle:

... we who have fled to take hold of the hope set before us may be greatly encouraged. We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure.

Hebrews 6:18b-19a

Water is an attraction for many people. Some enjoy a canal boat for the serenity and security it offers. For the adventurous, the exhilarating experience of white water rafting has greater appeal.

However, no white water enthusiast would want their life to resemble rafting, with the constant and desperate struggle to avoid overturning. Yet some people's lives are a bit like that. They are continually battered by the roaring waters of life. They long to be secure in placid waters.

Even in the apparent safety of a harbour, a boat must be anchored; otherwise, it will gently drift away with the tide or be swept away in a storm.

In these verses, the writer uses the anchor as a symbol of the hope which keeps the Christian fully secure. The Christian's hope is like an anchor firmly embedded in an immovable rock. That rock is Jesus Himself.

Are you drifting or being battered? Why not anchor yourself to Jesus? With Him, you will be secure forever.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I feel very insecure as I come up against one problem after another. I wonder how long I can manage to keep going. Please help me to know how I can have Jesus as a rock and how I can anchor my life to Him. Thank You.

INSULTED?

The crucifixion of Jesus:

Those who passed by hurled insults at him, shaking their heads and saying, 'So! You who are going to destroy the temple and build it in three days, come down from the cross and save yourself!'

Mark 15:29-30

Insults are hard to ignore. They wound us – as they are intended to – and we cannot pretend otherwise. They may remind us of something which we want to forget; perhaps something personal about us or our family; perhaps an unhappy episode from our past. Or they may just not be true.

Even as Jesus was dying on the cross, in great pain, the crowds hurled insults at Him. Their insults never had any element of truth: it was impossible to find fault in Him.

Their cruel and spiteful outbursts would have added to Jesus' anguish, just as insults hurt us. They also mocked Jesus by

misquoting what He had said about the temple being destroyed and rebuilt in three days. They had not understood that Jesus was talking about His own body and how He would be raised to life again. And of course He was.

Instead of retaliating, Jesus entrusted Himself to Father God who judges justly.¹ When we are insulted, we should try to follow Jesus' example.

DEAR FATHER GOD

Those who insult me must hate me and I feel hatred towards them. I know I am wrong to have these feelings but it is hard to ignore remarks which are meant to hurt. Please help me not to retaliate and please protect my heart from insulting words.

ISOLATED?

The words of King David:

Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?

Psalm 139:7

The words of the Apostle Paul:

For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Romans 8:38-39

Many of us will feel isolated at some time in our lives; it may be for a matter of days or weeks or it may continue for months or even years.

Many factors can cause us to be isolated: by a move to a new area, by illness or accident, by a relationship breakdown or

family dispute, by unemployment or financial difficulties or even by imprisonment.

The words of King David remind us that we can never be isolated from God. Wherever we are, God is there too. And the Apostle Paul, whilst alone in prison, knew that God was with him. That is also true for every one of us, whatever our circumstances and however isolated we might feel.

Are you isolated from family and friends? Or perhaps you have no family or, at least, no contact with them. Remember that you are not separated from God. Receive the love He offers you, right where you are.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am isolated and it is very painful. I am thankful that nothing can separate me from Your love. Please help me to know that You are with me at all times and may the knowledge of Your presence and Your love keep me strong.

LONELY?

Words of Jesus:

'I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me...'

John 10:14

It is very painful when we have no one: when there is no one to ask how we are feeling; when there is no one who has the time or inclination to visit or call; when there is no one who realises how lonely we are.

Jesus likens Himself to a shepherd. Shepherds know and care for all their sheep. They care for each one individually. If one sheep goes off alone, the shepherd will go and search for it. The shepherd will never forget any one of his flock.

That is a wonderful illustration of how God sees us. We are all very precious to Him. He knows every one of us by name and we are never out of His sight, never alone. We may find that difficult to grasp but it is true.

Lonely? Then entrust your life to Jesus, the good and perfect shepherd, and become one of His sheep. As one of His flock, you will be welcomed as a member of God's family. The steps you need to take are explained on pages 113-121.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am beginning to realise just how lonely I am. It is very painful. It is staggering to think that You know every person on this earth by name – and that includes me. I do want Jesus to be my shepherd and I want to be part of Your family.

LOST?

The words of a loving father:

"... But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found."

Luke 15:32

This verse comes at the end of the parable which Jesus told of The Prodigal (or Lost) Son.¹ In the story, the younger of two sons asks his father for his share of the inheritance and then leaves home.

The inheritance is soon squandered. Without any friends and barely able to get enough food to survive, he is lost to know what to do.

Eventually, his thoughts turn to home. Reluctantly (and ashamed), he decides to return, just hoping that his father might show mercy. All he wants is to be hired as a servant.

He need not have feared. His father is so thrilled when he sees his son in the distance that he runs to meet him and embraces him. The father then lays on a feast to celebrate the lost son's return.

That is a wonderful picture of God, our Heavenly Father, who longs to welcome back all who recognise that they are lost. Are you?

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am like that lost son. I thought I would have a better life if You were not a part of it. How wrong I was. I now realise I do need You. I am very sorry.

MALIGNED?

Words of King David:

Do not let those gloat over me who are my enemies without cause; do not let those who hate me without reason maliciously wink the eye.

They do not speak peaceably, but devise false accusations against those who live quietly in the land.

Psalm 35:19-20

'Sticks and stones may break my bones but words will never hurt me.' This saying aims to encourage children to ignore what others say about them but it is not true; words can hurt. Malicious words can be more destructive than sticks and stones. And if the words are untrue, then the pain becomes even more difficult to bear.

When enemies of King David made false accusations against him, he asked God to intervene and to put them to shame. The Bible says that we should not take revenge but allow God to act: "'It is mine to avenge; I will repay," says the Lord.' 1

When false accusations were made against Jesus, resulting in His death, He did not defend Himself. Instead, as He hung on the cross, He asked God to forgive those responsible.

If you have been maligned, try not to respond with anger. That will only add to your pain. Why not ask God to help you follow Jesus' example?

DEAR FATHER GOD

You know that the things being said about me are untrue and they are really hurting me. Please cause these people to stop. And please help me to put aside my anger and forgive them.

OPPRESSED?

Words of the Psalmist:

He upholds the cause of the oppressed and gives food to the hungry.

The LORD sets prisoners free, the LORD gives sight to the blind, the LORD lifts up those who are bowed down, the LORD loves the righteous.

Psalm 146:7-8

These verses remind us that God is compassionate: He has a concern for everyone in need but especially for those whom society looks down upon. Amongst others, the Psalmist mentions the oppressed, that is the downtrodden; the exploited; the disadvantaged; and the underprivileged.

Jesus demonstrated the reality of God's compassion when He was on earth. He always had time for people who were oppressed by others. That compassion was seen in many of the

healings He performed: of lepers; of the blind; of the lame; of the demon-possessed.

It was also seen in His choice of 'friends': He became known as a 'friend of tax collectors and sinners'. (Tax collectors were resented by their fellow Jews because they worked for the Romans and were corrupt in charging extra tax for their own pockets.)

If you are oppressed, there can be no better friend to have than Jesus. He knows just how you are feeling. He has time for you if you will take time to speak with Him.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I take great comfort when I read of the sort of people Jesus chose to spend time with. I think He would have spent time with me. Please help me to understand how I can get to know Jesus as a friend.

Peace, Hope, Joy

True peace comes only from knowing God personally by faith in Jesus Christ. Jesus was called Prince of Peace¹. He alone can give us an inner peace to help us through our struggles in life.

True hope – a sure hope – comes only from knowing that we can look forward to a glorious future, free of struggles, beyond this life.

True joy comes only from the Holy Spirit who comes to dwell within us when we enter into a personal relationship with God.

We can only enjoy a personal relationship with God through faith in His Son, Jesus Christ. First, we must accept that there is sin in our life. Sin is our failure to observe God's laws, especially the first commandment, 'You shall have no other gods before me.'2

Then we must repent of our sin and accept God's remedy for it. It requires nothing more but nothing less.

God's words from the Bible to all who trust in Jesus:

Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. Romans 5:1-2a

Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times and in every way. The Lord be with all of you. 2 Thessalonians 3:16

Brothers and sisters, we do not want you to be uninformed about those who sleep in death, so that you do not grieve like the rest of mankind, who have no hope. 1 Thessalonians 4:13

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you... 1 Peter 1:3-4

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace...

Galatians 5:22a

To repent of our sin means to turn away from our sin and to resolve, with God's help, to live to please Him.

And God's remedy for our sin was His amazing act of great kindness, love and mercy: He sent His Son, Jesus, to stand in our place to take the punishment which we deserve. Jesus did that when He was crucified.

And so we have to decide whether to accept God's remedy for our sin and receive His forgiveness. If we choose not to, we will have to face God's wrath and take His punishment ourselves.

How we receive God's forgiveness – and the consequences of refusing His forgiveness – is explained more fully in *Our Biggest Struggle* on pages 113-121.

As a child of God – a Christian – we will still encounter the same struggles. But God's Spirit will give us peace and joy, knowing that we are safe in His hands. And we will have the right perspective on our struggles, with the hope – the absolute confidence – of a future eternal life with God, free of all the troubles and struggles which we have to endure in this life on earth.

You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly. Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous person, though for a good person someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Since we have now been justified by his blood, how much more shall we be saved from God's wrath through him! Romans 5:6-9

Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

2 Corinthians 4:17-18

OVERWHELMED?

Words of Jesus:

'Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock...'

Matthew 7:24

Jesus spoke of two builders: one who built his house on foundations of rock and the other who simply built his house on sand. It was inevitable that the house without foundations would collapse when a severe thunderstorm came. And that is what happened.

Jesus used this to illustrate the importance of building our lives upon a proper foundation, in order that we should not be overwhelmed by the pressures, tensions and struggles which can be a part of everyday life.

The truly wise man is the one who puts his trust in Jesus. He knows that Jesus will be there to help him when there is a danger of being overwhelmed by troubles. The wise man's faith becomes the very foundation of his life.

God Himself has declared, 'No, there is no other Rock; I know not one.' If you are being swamped by problems which threaten to overwhelm you, why not start building your life on Jesus, with Him right at the centre?

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am so vulnerable because I panic when I think I am going to be overwhelmed by a crisis. I need something or someone I can really trust. I will ask Jesus to be my rock: I believe that only He can be the rock I need.

REJECTED?

A prophecy concerning Jesus:

He was despised and rejected by mankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain.

Isaiah 53:3a

The trial of Jesus:

But the whole crowd shouted, 'Away with this man! Release Barabbas to us!'
Wanting to release Jesus, Pilate appealed to them again. But they kept shouting, 'Crucify him! Crucify him!'

Luke 23:18, 20-21

Rejection is always hard to accept, for we all have a fundamental need to belong and to be wanted. It is hard when your friends – even your family – turn their back on you; when your job applications are continually rejected and when you are told by a charity that you are 'not suitable' to be a volunteer.

Jesus knows all about rejection. Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor, wanted to release Jesus (under the custom of releasing a prisoner at the annual Passover festival). But the crowd rejected Jesus in favour of Barabbas who was being held in prison for insurrection and murder.

As Barabbas was freed, so Jesus was condemned to be crucified. It was no surprise to Jesus that people who once followed Him sided with the religious leaders in rejecting Him.

We know that Father God will never reject anyone who turns to Him, believing in Jesus. If you believe in Jesus you need never fear God's rejection.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I know that You will never reject me. Thank You. Please help me to overcome the pain from my past rejection. And please help me to follow Jesus' example in not retaliating against those who have hurt me.

Ben's Story

Being brought up in a Christian home, it was quite early in life that I made a decision to follow Christ. But my teens brought regular conflict with competing worldviews and eventually I began to succumb to temptations which resulted in poor decisions and made the family home a difficult place. I failed to acknowledge the problem and thrived off confidence and popularity.

I moved out before my 18th birthday. I had left school earlier than planned and so had my first taste of working life. But soon the dynamics changed in my social circles; personal health issues came to the fore and my confidence dropped significantly. Again I wrestled with life's big questions and I sought out God, albeit alone and haphazardly.

A family wedding abroad proved to be a turning point. I had not been in a church for years and had

felt really isolated for so long. I was struck immediately by the warmth of the Christians there who I had never met before; I wanted what they had. I was so convicted of that on the plane journey home that I mused that I would sooner jump out of the plane than go back to life as it was. At home, alone in my flat, I earnestly prayed the sinner's prayer again and experienced a huge weight being lifted. On returning to church, I was welcomed just as the father had welcomed his prodigal son in Jesus' parable.

Later, I was led by the Holy Spirit to move location and job in amazing circumstances. Family relationships were fully restored and I met my wife. With a successful police career, a wonderful wife and with four children, I can now look back 20 years later and see the wonderful providence of God. Looking forward I see only hope for this life and eternity with my Saviour.

Timothy's Story

I became a Christian at the age of 18 and I joined the Police shortly afterwards. Whilst I never lost my faith, I did not attend church for many years. But God still blessed me with a wife and a family and in my career as I was promoted through the ranks.

But by the time I became a Senior Detective, my heart had grown cold. Encountering death and serious crime along with all the pressures of work, I began to lose empathy with the 'normal' things in life. I think it was a protection mechanism – but not one I would recommend!! Family life was tough; after dealing with some horrible crime, it was so hard to bring myself to 'feel' what a husband and father should feel.

My wife encouraged me to go to our local church which our pre-school children attended. She realised that something was missing in my heart! Eventually I followed her advice and it felt like I had arrived home in that church.

Things haven't always been easy since then but I am certain that getting back to church saved my marriage. God has blessed our lives together and I am certain that He has a plan for all of us just as we are told in Jeremiah: "... For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future ..."1

Why do I say this? Very recently, I came across a letter which a kindly person wrote to me 35 years ago while I was in training, assuring me that the Lord would sustain me in my police career. And the Lord has. With the support of His people, He has sustained me through good times and bad, and has always given me hope in the darkest of times.

Rebecca's Story

Policing was always a possible career option for me but my interest was really sparked while on jury service and as I observed officers giving evidence. I ignored the advice of friends that it was 'not the right job for a woman', and I was successful in applying to be a special constable. Those two years gave me the confidence that I had the right skills. More importantly, I felt that policing was God's calling for my life. And so in 2006 I became a 'professional'.

I was not prepared for what I encountered. I had been brought up in a Christian home, had made a personal decision to follow Christ when I was twelve and had belonged to Christian 'bubbles' at school, university and at church. As a new recruit in uniform, I was shocked by how people spoke, acted and behaved (and that was just the cops!). But I did not doubt my calling.

Through my different roles, I have met people from many different backgrounds and beliefs. I have changed the way I look at my own faith and I no longer see things as black and white. At times I have questions and doubts but I always come back to Jesus' teachings and the example He set. I believe that we are all individually loved by God, loved so much that He sent His Son, Jesus, to die for us.

My faith had taken a bit of a battering while at university. My mum was diagnosed with a rare form of liver cancer. Surgery seemed to be successful but she died two years later when the cancer returned. I struggled to understand why God would not heal someone so wonderful – 1,000 people attended her funeral – and yet, He sustained me.

I now attend our village parish church with my husband and two daughters. I look to share God's love and to support my friends and colleagues, whether they share my faith or not.

RESTLESS?

Words of the Apostle Paul:

But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he himself is our peace, ...

Ephesians 2:13-14a

Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, ...

Colossians 3:15a

Life today seems designed to make us restless and unsatisfied: always wanting something more or just something different.

We think that we will be satisfied if we can only find a new (and better) job or home, a new relationship or a new interest. But rarely are we fully satisfied for long; often we will soon be restless again, perhaps not even sure what to strive for next.

The real reason for our restlessness is that we have failed to understand the purpose of life: that life has no real purpose if God has no part in it. We were created in God's image in order to be in a relationship with Him and to please Him. Unless that becomes our purpose, we will constantly be restless.

If you want to be free from constant restlessness, pursue God's purpose for your life by trusting His Son, Jesus Christ. Allow Him to rule in your heart and to be your peace.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I have been restless for as long as I can remember. But that is not how I want my life to be. I want to be settled and satisfied and to have peace in my heart. I realise I need Jesus to rule my life.

SCARED?

Words of King David:

Truly he is my rock and my salvation;
he is my fortress, I shall not be shaken.
My salvation and my honour depend on God;
he is my mighty rock, my refuge.
Trust in him at all times, you people;
pour out your hearts to him,
for God is our refuge.

Psalm 62: 6-8

David's early life as a shepherd boy may have been fairly peaceful. He did not seem to be unduly troubled by the danger of prowling lions and wolves. Nor was he scared when he faced Goliath, the great Philistine giant whom he then defeated.

Later, however, David did receive some death threats which caused him to be scared. First, King Saul tried to kill him when he became jealous of David's popularity with the people. After that, David was forced to escape from his own son, Absalom.

When we read some of David's Psalms, we see that he often cried out to God to ask for protection from his enemies. And he was able to say that God was his rock, his fortress and his refuge. He knew God would never fail him.

Whatever your circumstances, that can also be true for you. God can be your rock and your refuge.

DEAR FATHER GOD

As You know everything, You know how scared I am about the situation I am now facing. I am willing to admit it. Please protect me. I want You to be my refuge just as You were King David's refuge.

SHNKING?

Words of King David:

I waited patiently for the LORD;
he turned to me and heard my cry.
He lifted me out of the slimy pit,
out of the mud and mire;
he set my feet on a rock and
gave me a firm place to stand.
He put a new song in my mouth,
a hymn of praise to our God.

Psalm 40:1-3a

David begins this Psalm by describing God's help like being rescued from a slimy pit. It is a picture of David being utterly helpless, sinking slowly into the slimy mud.

Later in the Psalm, David makes a further urgent plea to God to save him, 'Be pleased to save me, LORD; come quickly, LORD, to help me.' (v13). He is overwhelmed by further troubles which, he says, are 'too many to count'. Some of them are the result of his own sin.

After pleading for God's mercy, David finally prays this prayer (v17):

'But as for me, I am poor and needy; may the LORD think of me. You are my help and my deliverer; you are my God, do not delay.'

God is still lifting people out of their 'slimy pits' when they recognise how helpless they are and decide to cry out to Him. If you identify with David's circumstances – with problems too many to count – why not cry out to God as David did?

DEAR FATHER GOD

With all the issues I am facing, I feel as though I am sinking in a slimy pit, like David imagined he was. Please hear my cry for help and deliver me. I want to be on firm ground and able to praise You.

TROUBLED?

Words of Jesus to His disciples:

'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you.
I do not give to you as the world gives.
Do not let your hearts be troubled
and do not be afraid. ...'

John 14:27

Jesus spoke these words to comfort His disciples. After sharing 'The Last Supper' together, Jesus had explained that He would shortly be leaving them. This was devastating news. Naturally, they were troubled about what would happen to them: they had spent the last three years with Jesus, having given up everything to follow Him.

Jesus assured the disciples that He would not leave them on their own like orphans: God the Father would send the Holy Spirit to be their Helper.¹ And because of His presence in their hearts, the disciples would enjoy peace. That promise was not just for those disciples. Today, every believer in the Lord Jesus Christ has the Holy Spirit living in them. They, too, can enjoy perfect peace in times of trouble.

That does not mean that followers of Jesus do not experience trouble, for we live in a troubled world. What it does mean is that, despite their troubles, God's peace will guard their hearts and minds.²

DEAR FATHER GOD

More than anything else, I want to have peace in my heart, despite everything that is going on in my life. Please give me peace that I may be able to cope with the troubles I have to deal with.

UNLOVED?

The Apostle John wrote:

See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God!

And that is what we are!

1 John 3:1a

Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. This is how God showed his love among us: he sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him.

1 John 4:8-9

To love and to be loved are two of the most basic needs of human beings. We often take them for granted.

Sadly, because of broken relationships and broken families, many people do not have those needs met. Some may never have truly experienced love at all.

The Bible tells us that God is love. He loves us far more than we can possibly imagine and He wants every one of us to be a true child of His.

These are not just nice words to make us feel good. God proved His love by providing the way by which we can be rescued. He did that by sending Jesus to die for us.

Have you experienced God's love for yourself? If not, why not consider inviting Him to take control of your life and so become a part of His family? The steps you need to take to do that are explained on pages 113-121.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I do feel unloved. For years I have longed to find love and to be able to show love to others but I have never succeeded. Please help me to understand how I can truly know You as a father, to be Your child and receive Your love.

Daniel's Story

Just four days before 'celebrating' my sixth birthday, it felt as though I had been abandoned at the children's home; I would spend the next eleven years there. There was a real camaraderie between us 'orphan kids' but we suffered prejudice and rejection from others (along with the torments). It was hard for me to bear on top of the rejection by my own family.

I attended local Catholic Schools and the Catholic Church. At first I blamed God for my situation as much as my parents. I questioned Him: 'If you are so powerful why am I here?' Gradually I realised that He had in fact been there for me all the time. My faith and my love of God increased.

In time I learned that my mother had had little option; badly treated by my father, she simply could not cope with me. God helped me to forgive my mother but, sadly, just as our relationship was improving, she died at the age of 54.

God helped me to forgive my mother ...

When I was 16 I joined the Police Cadets and went on to serve as a Police Constable for 30 years. My childhood experiences certainly enabled me to have greater empathy with the vulnerable of society, particularly young people. I could say to some of them: 'Been there, done that.'

Although I was deprived of the 'real love' a child would expect from their own parents, my faith has enabled me to live my life well. I know that the Lord has always been with me – and there is no greater love than His, which He demonstrated by sending His Son, Jesus, to die for us. And God has blessed me with my own loving family to support me. Yes, I still have the scars of that early life but I am so proud of what I have achieved – with God's help, of course.

Luke's Story

I was hiding in the bathroom. I had just rugby-tackled a man chasing my mum with a kitchen knife. She had escaped, but now I was cornered. I had two options; I could confront him again or I could climb out of the window.

I briefly thought about the first option in order to try to calm the situation with an apology. But as I saw the knife coming through the flimsy door, I realised that the window was the safer exit. And so I lowered myself onto the equally flimsy corrugated plastic roof of the conservatory.

The man wielding the knife was my father! Two police officers arrived. Sadly, they only regarded the incident as another 'domestic' with no visible injuries. (Psychological scars didn't count.) Their advice was to get a solicitor to take out an injunction

to keep my dad away. He was told to leave and would face arrest if he returned within 24 hours. And the officers left us to it.

The man wielding the knife was my father!

Mum and I had always been the punch bags in the family. My older brother was withdrawn and compliant. My younger brother was the apple of my father's eye. They talked and played football together. I was the one who stood up for mum, earning many beatings on the way.

When I was eight I was taken into local authority care and attended a special school. Amazingly I passed my 11-plus exam but the school could no longer accommodate me and I was sent back home. They seemed to think that, at 11, I was well able to look after myself! Unsurprisingly I had to endure regular bouts of violence.

My grandparents were chapelgoers. Their home was so peaceful and such a contrast to what I

experienced. Life began to change when my older brother invited me to attend the local chapel with him. There I met the most influential men in my life.

Having concluded that my dad despised me, I met two men who genuinely cared about me: Steve, the young pastor, and Jeff, in his 40s and with three children all about my age. They invited my brother and me to youth events. Jeff also invited me into his home. I was often there several times a week. The family just accepted me and were genuinely interested in me and the things I did and what I thought.

For Jeff and his family, chapel was more than a Sunday experience. His beliefs influenced the whole of his life. I wanted to understand what he believed and why he lived the way he did. I began to discover the reason.

I was slowly introduced to a man on whom Jeff and Steve, and their families, modelled their lives; to a man who didn't want to harm me but rather gave His life for me; to a man who showed compassion when I failed; to a man who wanted the best for me in all things; to a man who had prepared a place for me in His home. And so one day I called round to see Steve and told him I wanted to become a follower of this man, Jesus Christ.

I was slowly introduced to a man ... who didn't want to harm me but rather gave His life for me.

With the support and encouragement of the chapel, I managed to get into university and even went to America to work for a period. Jeff and his wife came to my wedding, and then the greatest irony, I joined the Police Service where I was able to help colleagues to understand the trauma of domestic abuse, to introduce new ways of dealing with young offenders and ultimately to launch a branch of the Christian Police Association.

Luke (not his real name) is a retired officer.

UNWORTHY?

Words of the younger son in the story of The Lost Son:

' ... I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.'

Luke 15:18-19

In Jesus' story of The Lost (or Prodigal) Son, the younger son decided that he had had enough of his job of feeding pigs. That was how low he had sunk, having wasted his share of his father's inheritance.

He thought that the best he could hope for was to get his dad to take him on as one of his servants: he no longer felt worthy of being his son. But he need not have worried: his father was so relieved and delighted to see his son again. (See 'Lost?', page 66)

Being unworthy is not a barrier to being accepted by God. The truth is we are all unworthy. None of us deserve God's love and acceptance, whether we have really messed up or whether we think we can boast about our good works.

The wonderful news is that Father God counts us worthy when we come to Him in the name of His Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus is the only One who is worthy.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am so grateful that I do not have to pass any test to show that I am worthy to be Your child. I know I would fail every test. Thank You for counting me worthy and for accepting me because I come to You in the name of Jesus.

WEAK?

Words concerning Jesus:

For we do not have a high priest who is unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

Hebrews 4:15-16

We may think that God is far too remote in heaven to be able to understand the realities of life on earth; the struggles which wear us down, leaving us so weak.

But that is not true. God knows everything about every one of us and cares for us personally. Also, these verses remind us that we come to God through Jesus (who acts as a high priest) and Jesus is certainly able to sympathise with our weakness. Jesus came to earth as a human being and experienced the difficulties and temptations of daily living just as we do. He had enemies who despised Him: they were always looking to find fault with Him. In His human weakness, Jesus constantly sought help from His Father in heaven.

If you are feeling weak, do not hold back from asking God for His help. You can approach Him with confidence, knowing that He is aware of your circumstances and that He wants to show you His grace and kindness.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am feeling weak and finding it difficult to cope with everything that is expected of me. I usually try to struggle on in my own strength but I cannot do that anymore. You know what I need to do. Please help me. Thank You.

WEARY?

An invitation from Jesus:

'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.

Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.'

Matthew 11:28-30

Jesus always had a special concern for those who were weary with the strains and stresses of life. They were the people who really wanted to hear what Jesus had to say and how He could meet their needs.

The attitude of the religious leaders was quite different. As well as being self-righteous, they considered themselves self-sufficient. Their pride would not allow them to accept they had a need of anything or anyone. Certainly they would never admit that there was anything they could learn or gain from spending time with Jesus.

So, this invitation was for the ordinary people of the day. It was for those who recognised that life did get tough at times and who were willing to admit to being weary and burdened.

Jesus' invitation has not expired: it remains open today. Are you weary with family or work responsibilities – or both? If so, is there anything to prevent you from asking Jesus to give you rest as He has promised?

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am not too proud to admit to being weary. Every morning I realise that I will never manage to do everything that people expect of me. Please help me not to take on more than I need to. And please help me to find rest for my soul with You.

WORRIED?

Words of Jesus:

Then Jesus said to his disciples: 'Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat; or about your body, what you will wear. For life is more than food, and the body more than clothes.

Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to your life? Since you cannot do this very little thing, why do you worry about the rest? ...'

Luke 12:22-23, 25-26

Often, it is uncertainty about the future that causes us to worry: and worry is like a thief who robs us of our peace of mind.

Jesus had just told a story of a rich farmer who was obsessed with safeguarding his future. Jesus called him a fool, because life itself is uncertain. He would soon die and all his labours would be wasted. It is foolish to plan for the future but leave God out of your life.

Jesus then told His disciples not to worry: worrying does not achieve anything. He reminds them that we are far more valuable to God than the birds and God feeds them.

Jesus assured the disciples that God knew all about their needs and they should leave the future in His hands. Instead of worrying, they were to focus on seeking God's kingdom.

Are you worrying about what might happen? It can be hard not to – but read again those words of Jesus. Try to follow His advice and trust Him.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I often worry about the future. Please help me to hand my worries over to You and to be able to trust You to provide for my needs. I realise that You know everything about me and my situation. Thank You for caring for me.

WORTHLESS?

Jesus and the blind beggar:

He called out, 'Jesus, Son of David,
have mercy on me!'
Those who led the way rebuked him
and told him to be quiet, but he shouted
all the more, 'Son of David, have mercy
on me!' Jesus stopped and ordered
the man to be brought to him.

Luke 18:38-40a

The blind beggar's cries for mercy were an embarrassment to the people. They must have thought a beggar was not someone worth bothering Jesus with. But they were wrong. They should have known that Jesus always had compassion on those in need.

Some of the people may have felt sorry for him but it seems that most of them looked down at him. Many might have regarded him as a worthless member of society. Perhaps that is how he thought about himself – worthless.

Jesus saw him quite differently: a very precious man created in God's own image. Jesus never ignored a cry for mercy and that is still the case today, for the Bible tells us that He is 'the same yesterday and today and for ever.'

If you feel worthless for whatever reason, call out to Jesus. He will not ignore your cry. Your circumstances are not important to Him. What matters to Him most is your desire to love Him and to follow Him.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am sure that people look upon me as being worthless. That is how I think of myself. Please God, have mercy on me just as Jesus showed mercy to that beggar and please help me through this difficult time.



OUR BIGGEST STRUGGLE

OUR BIGGEST STRUGGLE

There is one struggle which is always in the background. Yet we may not even recognise it as a struggle. It is the struggle to obey God's laws.

The Apostle Paul summed it up very well:

For I do not do the good I want to do, but the evil I do not want to do – this I keep on doing. Now if I do what I do not want to do, it is no longer I who do it, but it is sin living in me that does it.

Romans 7:19-20

Paul wanted to do the right things but was always failing. He knew the reason: the sinful nature within him.

Paul really struggled with these bad inner pressures. However, many people never think about this personal struggle between right and wrong. We tend only to think about the

struggles which cause us pain. But, when it comes to our problem with sin – breaking God's law – we must consider the pain we cause Him.

Why is God hurt when we sin?

When God created the world He made us in His likeness, so that we might relate with Him and live to glorify Him. But that has become impossible because of our sinful nature (which we inherited from Adam and Eve when they disobeyed God in the Garden of Eden).

The Bible tells us: '... for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.' Romans 3:23

God is absolutely holy and pure. He cannot tolerate sin and that is a barrier between God and us.

If God hates sin, does that mean He is not a God of love?

As God is just, He cannot simply ignore our sin. There has to be a punishment for it.

The Bible tells us: **For the wages of sin is death...** Romans 6:23a

But He is certainly loving and merciful. His love is so great that He longs to restore us rather than punish us. He made that possible by sending His Son, Jesus, to come to earth as a human being and to die in our place.

The Bible tells us: **But God demonstrates his** own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Romans 5:8

Does that mean God will not punish us?

It means that we will not have to face God's punishment but only if we choose to receive God's forgiveness. We can ask God to

forgive us if we believe that Jesus Christ paid the penalty for our sins and if we are willing to allow Jesus to rule our lives.

There is nothing we can do to earn God's forgiveness; it is a free gift. When we accept His gift of forgiveness, we begin a new life as a follower of Jesus; the Bible describes it as being 'born again'.1

What happens if we decide not to accept Jesus?

If we say, 'No', to God's rescue plan, we will be punished ourselves. That will happen when Jesus returns to earth, for He will come to judge – and punish – everyone who has not accepted God's offer of forgiveness.

It will be the most awful punishment of being separated from God forever

The Bible tells us: ... Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son. John 3:18

JESUS

Why was Jesus, the Son of God,

BETRAYED. ABANDONED, FALSELY ACCUSED. MALIGNED, CONDEMNED, FLOGGED. MOCKED. SPAT ON, ASSAULTED, INSULTED, RIDICULED, HUMILIATED

- and hung on a cross to die?

Anyone unfamiliar with the true story might assume that Jesus had been responsible for the most horrendous crimes – perhaps war crimes, acts of terrorism or serial killings – to deserve to be treated as He was and then be put to death.

His brutal crucifixion, at the age of about 33, was certainly the greatest miscarriage of justice in history but it did not destroy

God's plan: it fulfilled it.

Jesus' purpose for coming to earth was to die – in our place. He willingly took the punishment which we all deserve; from the worst of criminals to the most 'upright' of law-abiding citizens.

He did that so that all our sins might be forgiven.

What do I need to do to become a Christian?

You can become a follower of Jesus and have all your sins forgiven by:

- accepting that you have not kept God's laws and deserve to be punished,
- believing that only Jesus can rescue you from God's punishment,
- confessing the wrong things in your life and repenting of them, that is, turning away from them,
- deciding to live to please God as a follower of Jesus.

If you are ready to take those steps, you can do so now by using the following prayer.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I am very sorry for everything in my life, past and present, which is not right. I now repent of my sin.

Thank You for sending Jesus to die in my place, for my sins, in order to save me from the punishment which I deserve.

I want to live to please Jesus and to make Him the centre of my life – to be my King.

Please forgive all my sins and accept me as Your child. Please fill me with Your Holy Spirit to help me live a new life.

AMEN

If you have been sincere with this prayer, God has received you as His child. All your sins – past, present and future – are forgiven.

And what now? You will need to grow as a Christian and that can only happen if you meet regularly with other Christians where the Bible is taught carefully. Therefore, the first step is to link with a local church and with Christians who will be able to help and support you.





ABOUT PRAYER

WHAT IS PRAYER?

Prayer is often thought to be just asking for God's help, either for ourselves or others, when struggling with difficult situations. And of course cries for help are very real prayers and most of the prayers in this section are just that.

But prayer is much more than presenting our requests to God. It is the means by which we engage with God, not only making our needs known but also sharing with Him how we feel when things are going well. Through prayer, we can worship Him; we can thank Him for His goodness and we can express remorse when we have offended Him by things we have done or said.

WHO CAN PRAY?

Many people think that they are not 'good enough', or 'religious' enough, to pray, especially if they are not 'churchgoers'. They think that a priest or chaplain has to pray for them. In a way, no one is 'good enough' to speak with God because He is so perfectly holy. And yet, He is full of love and mercy and just longs for us to talk to Him, both in the good times as well as when we are finding life tough.

HOW SHOULD WE PRAY?

Prayer is not difficult. No special language is needed. It should simply be an honest conversation with God. He wants us to talk about how we really feel – both our happy and sad experiences – but always with respect and reverence.

When wanting to ask God for something, there are three questions we should ask ourselves:

- are we living in a way that is pleasing to God?
- are we requesting something that will please God?
- are we doing what we can ourselves to meet the need?

We also need to pray with faith, which means that we must believe that God will hear our prayers and answer them. The Bible also teaches us not to give up. That may mean continuing to pray for days or weeks or even months or longer. Clearly, that can be difficult because it is only natural to want our prayers answered quickly.

DOES GOD REALLY ANSWER OUR PRAYERS?

God loves us and will always answer our prayers in the way that is best for us and when it is best for us. We cannot see beyond the present circumstances but He knows the future – and our future. Sometimes He will choose to help us through a difficult situation rather than removing the problem. We may want a 'quick fix' but that is not always the best solution.

We need to trust God and that is often hard. We must remember that He wants more for us than just an easy and comfortable life. More than anything else, He wants us to be a true child of His. It is only then that we find real fulfilment in this life and can be certain that we will go to be with Him when we die. That is His ultimate desire for every one of us. (See pages 113-121.)

THE PRAYERS IN THIS BOOK

The following pages provide a very small selection of prayers appropriate for those engaged in policing. You may wish to use some of them. But, hopefully, they will be just a guide to help you use prayers of your own, using your own words and style. Remember, we pray when we have an honest conversation with God.

PRAYERS OF THANKS AND CONFESSIONS

Although our requests will often form the larger part of our prayers, it is important not to neglect to bring to God our worship, thanks and confessions.

There is a prayer of confession on page 136 and on pages 148-149 there is a list of some favourite psalms of praise which can help us to worship God.

A PRAYER FOR THE POLICE SERVICE

DEAR FATHER GOD

I pray for all who are engaged in policing throughout the UK, in helping to maintain peace, prevent crime and bring offenders to justice. Please help every member of staff, every officer and every volunteer, whatever their role, to serve diligently, with integrity and courage and to conduct themselves professionally at all times, even in the most stressful situations.

Please equip, and give discernment to, those who work in recruiting and training officers. I pray for Your help to all who have been recruited recently as they go through their training.

And Father God, please call people into policing from every part of our diverse communities, so that our Police Service is truly representative of the communities which we serve.

I especially pray for the protection of all officers who often face difficult, demanding and dangerous situations, as a direct result of protecting our communities.

Thank You, Lord, for Police Chaplains, and valued community groups such as Street Angels and Street Pastors. Please grant them Your help as they get alongside those in need of spiritual and emotional support and comfort. Whenever it is appropriate, enable them to speak of Your love and the forgiveness You offer to all who trust Christ and repent of their sin.

DEAR FATHER GOD

Father, I pray also for those who live in fear on account of the crime in their neighbourhoods, that community support officers and community representatives will help them to feel safe.

And Lord, please use the churches to demonstrate the love of Christ in practical ways and to draw many to find a new life in Christ.

DEAR FATHER GOD

I pray that You will enable the healing of all staff and officers who are off sick with work-related injuries or stress.

As they displayed courage in serving, please grant to them the courage they need to face the challenges ahead. Please equip the dedicated professionals who will support their rehabilitation, including the staff at the dedicated treatment and rehabilitation centres.

Please help their families and give them courage, too, for the challenges they will also face in supporting their loved one.

And for those whose injuries are the result of acts of violence, I ask that You will keep them free from any bitterness or hatred towards those responsible.

A PRAYER FOR VICTIMS OF CRIME

DEAR FATHER GOD

I pray for all victims of crime; for those who have experienced violence and abuse; for those still suffering, both physically and emotionally; for victims of burglary, theft and fraud. I pray especially for ... name any victims with whom you have had recent contact.

In Your mercy, Lord, please bring healing to them and, where necessary, restore their confidence to face the future without fear. Please also protect them from ongoing anger and hatred towards those responsible. Please equip those who support them, including Chaplains, Family Liaison Officers, Victim Support volunteers and family members.

Offenders' families often count themselves as victims too, for the shame and for the impact upon their lives. And so, Father, please meet their particular needs as well. I pray especially for ... name any offenders' families you are concerned for.

A PRAYER FOR THOSE GRIEVING

DEAR FATHER GOD

I ask that You will unite families in their grief and enable parents, brothers and sisters, children and the wider family to support one another.

Most importantly, Father, I ask that You will draw to Yourself all who grieve so that they might find, in You, the comfort and strength and peace which You alone can provide. Please keep them close to You.

A PRAYER FOR ALL IN SPECIAL NEED

DEAR FATHER GOD

I pray for those I know, both within the Police and outside, who are in special need; for those worried about their own health or the health of family members; for those who have been through a painful breakdown of a relationship or facing that possibility; for those with concerns about their children; for those struggling to manage their finances; for those needing employment; for those facing hard decisions. I pray particularly for ... name your friends and their needs.

Please grant patience to those who are supporting them. Please also help me to know how I can support them.

Father, I long that there should be healing of body and mind and restoring of broken relationships. And please help with the finding of solutions for those with financial worries and those without jobs. And please grant wisdom to those who especially need it because of the tough decisions they face.

A PRAYER I AM SORRY

DEAR FATHER GOD

I confess that what I did (or said) was wrong. (State what it was you did or said.) I am really sorry. I just wish that I had not acted so hastily. If I had taken time to think about what was happening I am sure I would have dealt with it differently. But it is too late now.

Father God, please help me to decide how I should try to make amends to ... (*name the person*). Please help them to accept my apology and to be able to forgive me.

And I realise that I have also hurt You and I need You to forgive me too, please. Thank You.

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
